ARMY AVIATION CONTRACTS AWARDS TOTAL 24 MILLION

The Army is awarding some 24 million to three firms for UH1 "Iroquois helicopter engines and equipment and for modernizing two versions of the Mohawk OV1 fixed wing aircraft.

Largest of the Army Aviation Materiel Commands awards is for UH1 (T53-L-13) engines. A 17 Millionmodification to existing contracts ia being awarded to AVCO Corporation, Strarford, Conn.

The UH1 commonly called the Huey comes in three configurations: a trainer a gunship, and a troop-cargo carrier. The engines will fit in any of these configurations.

A 1.3 million fixed-price contract is going to Collins Radio Corp., Addison, Tex., for UH1 avionic kits. This contract supersedes an existing letter contract.

Mohawk modernization will be done by Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corp., Bethpage, L.I. A 3.7 million contract modification is for the OV1B and a 2.3 million modification covers the OV1C.

MARINE GENERAL WALT ASSESSES VIETNAM PROGRESS

Marine Lt. Gen. Lewis W. Walt told a June 7 Pentagon news conference that "we are headed in the right direction in Vietnam."

Gen. Walt is the new Marine Corps Directer of Personnel/ Deputy Chief of Staff (Manpower) after two years in Viet nam. He was Commanding General of the III Marine Amphibious Force and the senior officer in the I Corps in the northernmost provinces of South Vietnam.

Commenting on the M-16 rifle used by U.S. forces in RVN, Gen. Walt said it is the finest weapon troops have ever had—particularly in Viet nam.

Now all infantrymen have Automatic weapons, the general explained, necessary for close fighting.

He said a survey conducted in Vietnam showed that of more than 13 million rounds fired, there were only 1,243 malfunctions.


Gen. Walt said he requested M-16s for Marines after the Army showed fine results with the rifle.

Speaking of flexibility displayed by Marines in Vietnam, Gen. Walt said "they fight one day" and the next day are helping people to re build homes and schools.

## DEPARTURE



#### EDITORIAL


The POUVOIRS have now spread operations to three different areas, in order to supply three different needs.



The old time residents greated the new arrivals with open arms, each one eagerly anticipating weekly KP, added inspections and "snug" living quarters.


#### DEPARTURES
